July in Australian History

July 1851. Joseph Latrobe was sworn in as the first Governor of the Colony of Victoria

Gold was discovered for the first time in Victoria. This find at Clunes and subsequent discoveries at Bendigo and Ballarat turned Victoria into the richest, and leading Colony of Australia.

2 July 1872. Adelaide, Melbourne and Sydney received the first news via the Telegraph from England. The overland Telegraph stretching across the deserts from Darwin to Adelaide allowed this dramatic breakthrough in communications.

July 1873. Ayers Rock was discovered by William Goss. A young, little known explorer on his one and only expedition. Named in honour of Sir Henry Ayers, Premier of South Australia.

- 13 July 1900. It was announced that John Adrian Hopetoun was to become the first Governor-General of the newly federated Commonwealth of Australia.
- 28 July1902. The birth of Albert Namatjira—Australia's most celebrated Aboriginal Artist.
- 10 July 1907. The first telephone call was made between Sydney and Melbourne.
- 18 July 1914. Averaging a speed of 64 miles per hour, Frenchman M Gillaux made the first flight from Melbourne to Sydney. He covered the 582 miles in just over 9 hours.
- 11July 1940. Petrol rationing was introduced for motorists.

 Private drivers were limited to 40 miles per week worth of petrol

Each year we hear or see on the news that there is a flu outbreak somewhere.

Aged Care Facilities, and specifically residents, are particularly vulnerable to outbreaks due to a number of reasons including being older (immune systems weaken as we age), having other illnesses, and the large quantity of people who live in, work at and visit the facility on a daily basis.

The Department of Health and Human Services has recently sent correspondence to all facilities and we include parts of that correspondence here:

Dear Residential Aged Care Provider,

I am writing regarding preparation for this year's influenza season. Influenza is one of several common pathogens which cause respiratory outbreaks. It is important to identify outbreaks caused by influenza early, so that infection control strategies are implemented to reduce the risk of transmission.





An outbreak is defined as three or more residents and/or staff with onset of respiratory symptoms occurring within a 72 hour period.

If you become aware of an outbreak, you should immediately notify the Department of Health and Human Services on 1300 651 160.

In preparation for the upcoming influenza season, we recommend that you and your staff review the Victorian Guidelines "Respiratory illness in residential and aged care – Guidelines and information kit",

This information kit is updated annually and Myrtleford Lodge Aged Care ensures that the policies and procedures are inline with the guidelines in this kit.

In particular the Guidelines recommend that:

1. The single best way to prevent influenza in the residential care setting is for residents and staff members to be vaccinated every year. Influenza vaccine is available now through GPs. Keep a record of all vaccinated staff and residents at your facility. In an outbreak you will be required to report this information to the department.

All residents at Myrtleford Lodge Aged Care were vaccinated in April. All new residents to the facility are required to provide their most recent vaccination details upon entry.

Myrtleford Lodge pays for every staff member to be vaccinated annually.

2. In the event of an outbreak, it is highly recommended that a designated Outbreak Management Team is formed, with individuals given specific roles for helping to control the outbreak. You and your staff should make plans now for who is most suitable to fill those roles.

Be assured that Myrtleford Lodge Aged Care has policies and procedures in place for any such occurrence.

In the event of an outbreak, the following immediate measures are recommended:

1. Implement infection prevention and control strategies, including isolation, hand washing and personal protective equipment, as per "Respiratory illness in residential and aged care – Guidelines and information kit".

One of the first stages of infection prevention is to discourage unwell visitors. Signs have been placed at the facility entry to discourage any visitor who has recently been unwell from entering the facility.



In the event of an outbreak all visitors will be discouraged from entry to assist in limiting the spread of infection.

During an outbreak Resident movement will be limited to avoid infected residents coming into contact with others. Like seasonal influenza, a pandemic strain could occur and would be expected to cause serious illness, hospitalisation and death in older people.

A note from the Administration Desk

Front Entrance;

The front entrance portico is a pick up and drop off 15 minute zone only, this area is required to be free to be utilized in an emergency situation.

Visitors who are using this area to pick up or drop off are asked to please turn their vehicles off whilst in the facility as the fumes from the vehicles left running are very overpowering with the front entrance doors opening and closing.

Car Parking.

With the addition of the new car parking area, we remind Residents and visitors, car parking is available in the first car park on entry to the facility with Staff Only car parking in the bays past the front portico.

We ask that you leave the staff car parking for staff vehicles only as a matter of staff safety. Staff are coming and going from the facility early morning and late at night in the dark.

The two disabled car parks directly accessible adjacent to the front portico are available to be utilised for this purpose only.

The Residents crossing is to remain free of vehicles at all times, this crossing enables our Residents to access the gazebo area safely.
