Dear Residents and Representatives: January 2013

We did it!! After a grueling 2 days on 18th and 19th December, and lots of probing, questioning and stress (on our parts mostly!) we were found to be compliant in all **44 out of 44** Aged Care Accreditation standards!

This result comes as a huge relief and affirmation of something we always knew – we do provide a Quality service to **you**, the Resident. The 4 accreditors reviewed all aspects of Woods Point and the report is available in the Low care lounge room for anyone to read.

Some of the comments made by the accreditors were:

"Outstanding facility and we would recommend Woods Point to their parents".

"We would move in tomorrow".

"There is a lovely friendly atmosphere in the facility and it was enjoyable to be a part of".

"Residents and staff interviewed were familiar with the complaints process and felt confident in raising issues directly with management".

"Documentation showed the linking of resident's needs, preferences and feedback to continuous improvement activities".

Observations indicated staff interact with residents/representatives in a supportive and consultative manner".

"Residents/representatives expressed satisfaction with the way in which staff communicate with them in relation to clinical and personal care."

"Documentation such as professional qualification, assessments of skills and education records demonstrated staff have the knowledge and skills to carry out their duties in relation to the provision of care including specialised care". Although you may not have been directly involved, I would like to acknowledge all the staff, residents and representatives for the hard work and commitment to Woods Point. The accreditors commented how our systems were excellent the communication both informally and formally was very robust and effective, and the documentation very impressive.

We will not get it right all the time but we are always striving to ensure residents needs and preferences are met whilst balancing the legislation required, red tape and many idiosyncrasies.

If we do not get it right please let us know by completing an improvement form, speaking to the staff or arranging to meet with myself to discuss any concerns or suggestions.



We are an amazing team and this recent audit is testament to that. It is nice to be acknowledged for the hard work!!!!!!

The information provided in the report gives me a clear indication that we will receive the maximum period of Accreditation, which is **3 years.** Well done everyone, and thank you to all our wonderful residents for their supportive and encouraging words!

Pain Relief



Residents are able to purchase their own hot/ cold gel packs. Staff will warm the packs in water when needed for use as a hot pack on painful areas.

The packs will be named and kept in resident rooms to ensure they are always available

when needed. The packs last for quite a long time but not forever, and may need to be replaced eventually.

Clothing Labels

A reminder to make sure that all items of clothing and belongings are clearly named. Staff always make numerous attempts to find the owner of unlabelled items, however very often it is not possible.

If you purchase new clothes, please hand them to staff and request that they be labeled immediately. Staff will alert you when you run out of labels and more can be purchased. In the interim a special

Laundry Marker should be used to clearly label the items of clothing so that they don't get misplaced.

Our clothing labels are applied using a special machine which ensures that they will not come off and we recommend that all clothes are labeled in this way.

From recent Infection Control checks: Nail manicure equipment, makeup, combs & brushes and razors cannot be shared – and all residents are required to have their own.



Brief Life History

Following a review of the Diversional Therapy program and the current information we collect for every resident as part of the social profile, we have developed a new document called 'Brief Life History'.

This information will enable Woods Point staff to find out more about the resident so we can better target the activities to the residents likes and dislikes as well as understand more



about some of the behaviours exhibited when managing residents with cognitive impairment.

If you would take the time to complete the document and return to Woods Point this would be of great assistance to further enhance the current Diversional therapy program.

Christmas Shopping Once again our residents were out in force to do their Christmas shopping before the big day. There is always that last minute gift that you need. Whatever the reason or even if there is no reason it is still good to get out into the shops and have a good look around. There were lots of specials and some very happy residents who returned to Woods Point a little bit poorer but a carrying a whole lot of gifts.

Samnang Ouy

Samnang was born on the 14th of December, 2004 and lives in Cambodia with his father, 2 brothers and 4 sisters.

Cambodia, as a country, suffered greatly due to civil war during the early 1970's. And in the late 70's under the commu-

nist Khmer Rouge, Cambodia became a 'closed' country.



The country was rescued by a United Nationssponsored peace treaty signed in 1991. Since then it has been a slow road to recovery for this small nation.

The tropical climate means that rainfall varies

and the result can be periodic droughts or floods. The community where Samnang lives lacks clean, safe drinking water. There is a lack of trained teachers and the long distances travelled and high cost of education means many children are unable to complete their schooling.

The mainly agricultural community relies heavily on their export crops, fishing and forestry. Samnang will face health issues such as tuberculosis and malaria, our sponsorship will help to improve the basic healthcare system for Samnang and his community as well improvements to the education system not only for the children but by providing training to the farmers to increase food production.

For the safety of all of our residents Woods Point Aged Care has implemented a heat wave policy. This

policy will mean that in the event of the temperature reaching 32°C the facility will restrict access of all exit doors to prevent any resident leaving the facility unaccompanied.

Staff must implement the <u>Heat Wave</u> <u>Management Plan (22.7.1).</u>

The signage will be placed on all external doors to alert residents and visitors when the policy has been implemented.

Direct Debit

Woods Point suggest that all residents have direct debit payments set up for such frequent accounts as Telstra, Pharmacy and Newsagents. We remind families that it is not always convenient for residents to get to Belmore Street to pay their individual accounts nor is it easy for them to get to the bank to access their cash. We have found that some residents do become distressed if they feel they are not able to pay their accounts on time.

And with the introduction of our Heat Wave Policy (see page 12) residents are not able to leave the facility unaccompanied once the outside temperature exceeds 32 degrees.

Woods Point policy is that staff and volunteers are not allowed to accompany residents to the bank as this could place them in a compromised position.

We have a very efficient Pocket Money system which is set up and managed by the administration staff and we recommend that all residents utilize this facility.



Woods Point were saddened by the passing of Marj Middleton at the end of November and in December we said farewell another much loved resident in Sue Hood. Marj had been a resident at for over five years and Sue for almost four years. Both ladies were always actively involved in the activities that occurred here at Woods Point and will be sadly missed.

We also said farewell to Mihail Glavan who had moved in recently with his wife Maria.
